

What's new in Arctic Region?

- On October 24, 2018, Fisheries, Oceans and the Canadian Coast Guard announced the creation of a stand-alone Arctic Region
- The Arctic Regions are advancing reconciliation with Indigenous peoples and seeking to develop service enhancements in collaboration with Northerners
- DFO Arctic Region is being led by Regional Director General, Gabriel Nirlungnayuq with its headquarters in Rankin Inlet
- Coast Guard Arctic Region is being led by Assistant Commissioner, Neil O'Rourke with its headquarters in Yellowknife



Accomplishments to date

- Extensive and ongoing engagement with partners and strengthening of relationships
 60+ to date
- Provision of a "What We've Heard" report to partners
- Leadership of some key Arctic activities now being led from the North
